A Wake-Up Call on World Environment Day

Once considered seasonal anomalies, heatwaves have now become a deadly annual phenomenon, particularly in cities like Karachi and Jacobabad. With temperatures soaring beyond 50°C, vulnerable populations, especially laborers, children, and the elderly, are at extreme risk.

Compounding this crisis is an alarming water shortage. Once lush rivers like the

Indus are drying at a rapid pace due to climate induced water shortage, poor water management, and upstream diversions. Southern parts of Sindh and Balochistan are experiencing drought-like conditions, pushing entire communities to migrate in search of water and sustenance. In many urban centers, access to clean drinking water is becoming a luxury rather than a basic right. But these are just symptoms of deeper environmental neglect. Deforestation,

unchecked urbanization, pollution from industries, and unregulated waste disposal are fueling the degradation of our ecosystems. Karachi, for example, generates over 12,000 tons of solid waste daily, much of which ends up in the Arabian Sea,

Despite these mounting challenges, environmental issues remain low on the national agenda. Pakistan must act decisively by investing in climate-resilient infrastructure, enforcing strict environmental regulations, and promoting community-based conservation. Citizens, too, must play a role by reducing plastic use, conserving water, planting trees, recycling, and holding leaders accountable.


