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## 1.0 Background

The [Laar Humanitarian and Development Programme \(LHDP\)](#), the [HELP Foundation](#), and the [Doaba Foundation](#) jointly established the [Indus Consortium for Humanitarian, Environmental, and Development Initiatives](#) (IC) in 2008 as a platform for organisations to coordinate humanitarian response, improve surge capacity and work together among the three founding organisations and other like-minded organisations mainly in humanitarian and climate resilience sectors.

**Doaba Foundation:** Doaba Foundation has extensive experience in implementing projects of varying scales across Punjab. Since 2003, it has successfully delivered over 145 projects of varying sizes, with a total financial portfolio of approximately PKR 4,500 million.

**HELP Foundation:** HELP Foundation focuses on humanitarian response, climate resilience, and WASH sectors in Punjab. Over the past decade, HELP Foundation has implemented 67 projects valued at approximately PKR 2,410.51 million.

### Laar Humanitarian & Development Programme (LHDP):

LHDP primarily operates in Sindh. The organisation's focus is on humanitarian programme (preparedness, response, anticipatory actions, recovery and rehabilitation phases), climate resilience, and WASH (both in humanitarian and development contexts). With extensive experience, LHDP has completed 76 projects with a total budget of approximately PKR 1,720 million.

The platform approach, as manifested in the IC, brought together the three founding organisations to build reliable surge capacity in the event of mega humanitarian crises and synergised their effectiveness. The three founding organisations finally registered IC as a legal entity under the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) under Section 42 of the Companies Ordinance.

The IC, as a humanitarian platform of three founding organisations, is currently responding to the 2025 floods in Punjab Province and is engaged in preparatory work in Sindh Province.

## 2.0 Key Points of the Previous Report

The previous situation report, dated August 28, 2025, provided the first consolidated update from the Indus Consortium on the 2025 monsoon floods. It described how LHDP, the HELP Foundation, and the Doaba Foundation launched their collective response across Sindh and Punjab. The three organisations activated their Emergency Response Teams, re-listed volunteers, and prepared essential equipment, such as boats and dewatering pumps, to support both anticipatory and emergency actions.

The report provided details about the work of member organisations of Indus Consortium. The Consortium members participated actively in daily coordination meetings with DDMA and worked on the ground in a wide range of flood-affected districts. In Punjab, this included Gujranwala, Sialkot, Jhang, Muzaffargarh, Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan and Bahawalpur. In Sindh, LHDP remained engaged in Dadu, Qamber-Shahdadt, Larkana, Khairpur, Sukkur, Jamshoro, Sujawal and Badin. Through these engagements, IC aligned its activities with government plans, promoted transparent beneficiary identification and supported early evacuation of vulnerable households. At the same time, the Consortium advocated that coordination should remain in the hands of district and provincial authorities. While acknowledging the growing role of international actors, IC emphasised that INGOs and UN agencies must support, rather than replace, local mechanisms.

The report highlighted pressing humanitarian gaps. Food, safe water, sanitation, temporary shelter, and protection of rural livelihoods emerged as priority needs, with a particular focus on livestock. To address these, the Consortium committed to reaching approximately 6,200 households with food and WASH services, as well as 10,000 households with shelter and NFIs. It underscored that these targets represented both urgent needs on the ground and the demonstrated capacity of member organisations to deliver. The report also called on civil society, donors, and philanthropists to provide financial and logistical support, particularly for transportation, boats, pumps, and other essential supplies, so that the response could be scaled up quickly and effectively.

## 3.0 Situational Update

### 3.1 General Situational Update

According to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) Monsoon Situation Report No. 64, the recent wave of floods in Pakistan (June 26 to August 28, 2025) has resulted in 820 fatalities, including 493 men, 123 women and 204 children, while 1,111 people have been injured, comprising 546 men, 270 women and 295 children (NDMA, 2025). Additionally, 8,975 households have been partially or fully damaged. The floods have also washed away approximately 658.25 kilometres of roads, destroyed 238 bridges, and resulted in the loss of 6,138 livestock. The most severely affected districts in Punjab include Sialkot, Narowal, Wazirabad, Lahore, and Sheikhupura, while Mirpur in AJ&K has also suffered significant damage. The communities across Sialkot, Gujrat, Wazirabad, Narowal, and Mandi Bahauddin in Punjab, suffering from casualties, injuries, widespread house damage, and significant livestock losses as a result of flash floods and heavy rains. PDMA Sindh has warned that Karachi, Thatta, Sujawal, Badin, and other coastal areas may receive heavy rainfall with thunderstorms on September 2, posing risks of urban flooding.

### 3.2 Our Situational Update

In **Punjab**, **Doaba Foundation** is leading anticipatory and post-trigger actions in *Gujranwala, Sialkot, Muzaffargarh, and Jhang* with support from the Start Network (UK). In Gujranwala, Doaba conducted planning meetings, assessments, and field visits in Union Council Mansoor Wali, where urgent needs include food, safe water, sanitation, shelter, hygiene kits, and fodder. Post-trigger WASH and food security interventions are underway, though data collection remains a challenge. In Muzaffargarh and Jhang, Doaba reactivated the Chenab Forum and worked with the DDMA office to identify vulnerable points, establish evacuation plans, and strengthen community preparedness through Emergency Response Teams. In Jhang, where rising water levels in the Chenab have triggered evacuations, Doaba worked with the Chenab Forum and convened a coordination meeting with social welfare officials and civil society partners to align early action and joint assessments.

**HELP Foundation** is actively pursuing its comprehensive response framework, strategically aligning its available resources with anticipated flood scenarios across *Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan, and Bahawalpur*, with a clear emphasis on vulnerable populations and coordinated efforts with governmental bodies. The organisation maintains crucial supplies, including health and hygiene kits, mosquito nets, plastic sheeting, hand pumps, jerry cans, and torch lights, ready for immediate deployment in the most severely affected districts. The key current and anticipated actions involve Situational Oversight and Collaboration, where the HELP Foundation is closely monitoring the evolving flood situation and engaging in ongoing coordination with the district administration. For Bahawalpur, the established early warning system is fully operational, providing at-risk communities with timely notifications and essential safety guidance, thereby assisting in the relocation of both residents and livestock to secure locations while upholding order.

In response to the escalating flood situation, **LHDP** has initiated several key measures. They have allocated PKR 1 million from their own funds for response activities and established an Emergency Response Unit at the head office. A rapid assessment of the 9 most vulnerable districts is underway to identify vulnerable communities and their immediate needs. Focal persons are being onboarded in these districts to monitor the situation and share information with the ER Unit at the Head Office in Badin, while a list of potential volunteers for data collection and response is in progress. LHDP has also developed a coordination mechanism with PDMA Sindh and District Disaster Management Authorities (DDMAs) and is maintaining its stockpile of essential equipment, including three motorboats, eleven dewatering pumps, twenty megaphones, and water testing kits.

The district-wise details are the following:

### 1. Gujranwala

Doaba Foundation, with Start Network (UK) support, is responding to recent floods through preparedness and early action. In Union Council Mansoor Wali and nearby areas, urgent needs include food, safe drinking water, sanitation, hygiene kits, temporary shelter, fodder, and de-watering support. Doaba has been working closely with district authorities, holding coordination meetings and visiting affected villages and relief camps. Communities reported that the lack of early warning left them stranded in 6–7 feet of water, with rescue operations still ongoing. Around 25,000 acres of crops are damaged, and thousands of livestock remain at risk. District officials are welcoming collaboration, and Doaba urges philanthropists and humanitarian actors to align efforts with the administration for an effective response. A UN OCHA representative was expected in Gujranwala on 29 August to strengthen joint coordination with the government and civil society. Challenges persist in data collection from affected households. The Doaba Foundation team is currently present in the city headquarters and coordinating with local CSOs for the expansion of the response.

### 2. Muzaffargarh

Doaba Foundation successfully carried out evacuation operations in several revenue villages, including Mako Jamala, Balkana, Deer Dad, Sunmaloot, Rana Wahin Pipli, Ganji, Lashkarpur, Traf Majhan Sultan, Darmari, Shaikhpur Paka Makhdoom, and Alipur Janobi, as well as in union councils Rabbpur, Jarh, Muradabad, and Chaka Farazi. A total of 7,419 people were evacuated, comprising 2,250 women, 2,027 men, 1,482 boys, and 1,660 girls.

The Early Warning Committees played a vital role by issuing timely alerts through street and mosque announcements, and by coordinating with Rescue 1122 to mobilise communities for evacuation. To strengthen coordination and response, Doaba Foundation established its NGO Coordination Hub at the Social Welfare Department office in Muzaffargarh, supporting operations across the Dera Ghazi Khan Division.

Considering the severity of the situation, Doaba Foundation also engaged with the START Network for Muzaffargarh, which led to the reallocation of 50 targeted activities from Gujranwala District to Muzaffargarh.

### 3. Jhang

In Jhang, DOABA Foundation is actively supporting flood-affected communities through its engagement with the Chenab Forum Jhang, facilitating early warning dissemination, evacuation coordination, and inclusive relief outreach. Doaba ensures a timely information flow to communities and is ready for dignified humanitarian assistance. Meanwhile, Trimu Headworks is under mounting pressure due to the merging floodwaters of the Chenab and Jhelum rivers, with discharge levels rising rapidly and posing serious risks to downstream settlements. Authorities have issued high flood alerts, and Doaba is closely coordinating with the district administration to monitor the situation and support vulnerable populations. In Jhang District, evacuation operations were carried out in Union Councils Hazrat Sultan Bahoo (UC-74), Samandoana (UC-79), and Pir Abdul Rehman (UC-76), covering several villages. A total

of 7,232 individuals were safely evacuated, including 2,493 women, 2,027 men, 1,482 boys, and 1,230 girls. The operation was facilitated through effective collaboration between local Early Warning Committees and Rescue 1122.

#### 4. Sialkot

**Doaba Foundation** has initiated anticipatory and early response actions in Sialkot after torrential rains shattered a 49-year record with 600 mm of rainfall in a single day, inundating large parts of the city, including the Airport building and surrounding villages. Overflow from Nullah Dek has forced evacuations from nearby settlements, while low-lying areas, including Rang Pura, Shahab Pura, Dara Arain, Allama Iqbal Chowk, and Prem Nagar, remain severely affected. In coordination with the District Administration and Rescue 1122, Doaba's ERTs are supporting evacuation and awareness efforts, particularly for vulnerable households. Urgent needs include safe drinking water, emergency sanitation, and temporary shelter for displaced families. Schools have been closed and Section 144 imposed by the Deputy Commissioner, underlining the seriousness of the situation. Building on its experience in Gujranwala and Jhang, Doaba Foundation is mobilising volunteers, conducting field assessments, and working with authorities to ensure preparedness measures are aligned with community needs.

**5. Multan:** The Divisional Director of Social Welfare chaired a coordination meeting in Multan to strengthen flood response efforts. During the meeting, NGOs were assigned sector-specific roles to support community safety, evacuation, and essential services. The District Government has activated a full-time control room to monitor the situation and ensure timely action. Doaba Foundation, with its head office based in Multan, is actively coordinating with relevant government departments and humanitarian actors to facilitate inclusive relief operations, conduct needs assessments, and ensure the protection and dignity of vulnerable populations, including persons with disabilities.

**6. Lodhran:** The Doaba Foundation team is supporting evacuation efforts in Lodhran district. Doaba Foundation actively participated in coordination meetings with the District Disaster Management Committee (DDMC) to align flood preparedness measures and conducted field visits to vulnerable sites, including Chamb Mor, to assess embankments, settlements, and evacuation routes. A dedicated meeting with Rescue 1122 Lodhran was held to plan joint evacuation support and safe-boat access in the event of riverine flooding. Through the Doaba Women Welfare Forum (DWWF), community orientations were organised to reactivate flood emergency awareness, particularly engaging women leaders and community focal persons. The flood emergency control room contact number was updated and disseminated for direct community access, while a review of DF's contingency stock was undertaken to assess the availability of hygiene kits, water purification consumables, PPE, and logistics supplies. Additionally, procurement and pre-positioning of chlorine tablets, jerrycans, and family hygiene kits have been planned in high-risk union councils, including Adam Wahan, Qureshiwala, and Jhoke Janan.

Although consolidated evacuation figures are not yet available, district authorities confirm that 1,572 individuals have already been displaced due to rising water levels. The District Administration, in close coordination with Rescue 1122, is actively engaged in evacuation and relocation efforts, with particular emphasis on ensuring the safety of both residents and their livestock. Given that dams are approaching full storage capacity and river flows have reached critical levels, continuous monitoring is being undertaken. Authorities are disseminating alerts through loudspeakers, mobilising communities, and enforcing precautionary measures to mitigate risks. The situation in District Lodhran remains dynamic, with authorities maintaining a high level of preparedness to respond swiftly to any further surges in floodwater.

#### 7. Rajanpur

HELP Foundation is proactively ramping up its preparedness for severe river flooding by mobilising 80 dedicated volunteers, who are undergoing specialised training to address the unique challenges of widespread inundation.

In 10 Union Councils, residents from approximately 50 villages are actively disseminating early warnings using megaphones, loudspeakers, and mobile phones to apprise communities of escalating flood threats. This community-based early warning system facilitates families in proactive preparation and timely relocation to safer areas. The evolving flood situation is being closely monitored, with coordination efforts underway with the District Administration in Rajanpur. In anticipation of potential flooding from the Indus River, the HELP Foundation has developed an emergency response plan. Currently, 80 trained volunteers (30 women and 50 men) have been mobilised, as the HELP Foundation has been engaged with the riverine community of the Indus River since 2006.

#### 8. Rahim Yar Khan

HELP Foundation is actively coordinating its response network to facilitate the evacuation of affected households and safeguard their possessions. The organisation is prioritising the evacuation of vulnerable populations utilising high-speed boats and is collaborating with relevant authorities to ensure evacuations are conducted in a dignified and orderly manner. The organisation has established a robust network of responders and resources to address the immediate and evolving needs of communities impacted by the ongoing crisis.

#### **9. Bahawalpur**

The early warning system in Bahawalpur is actively providing at-risk communities with timely alerts and safety guidance. The HELP Foundation is supporting the relocation of people and livestock to safer grounds while maintaining order. The HELP Foundation is actively implementing its comprehensive evacuation strategy in Bahawalpur. This multi-faceted plan prioritises the safe relocation of vulnerable households and their essential livestock to designated secure locations, thereby minimising exposure to ongoing risks.

#### **10. Dadu**

The local office is closely working with community volunteers to identify vulnerable households and coordinate with the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA). The team also supports preparedness by keeping dewatering pumps and motorboats ready for deployment.

#### **11. Qamber-Shahdadkot**

LHDP has mobilised community groups and volunteers to reactivate various committees in preparation for the anticipated floods in the district. Its humanitarian department is coordinating closely with the DDMA and participating in regular meetings to ensure the timely sharing of early warning information with communities. The warehouse of LHDP has some basic items of response, like WASH kits, etc.

#### **12. Larkana**

LHDP has mobilised community groups and volunteers to re-activate various committees in preparation for the anticipated floods in the district. The humanitarian department of LHDP is closely coordinating with the DDMA and participating in regular meetings to ensure the timely sharing of early warning information with communities. The LHDP Program Manager, Mr. Sawan Khaskhali, is based in Larkana and is closely monitoring the evolving flood situation in northern Sindh.

#### **13. Khairpur**

LHDP has mobilised its volunteer network and remains engaged with district authorities to ensure the timely dissemination of flood alerts. The office contributes to preparedness by coordinating with local partners, assisting communities in identifying safe evacuation routes, and maintaining essential response equipment.

#### **14. Sukkur**

LHDP is supporting both preparedness and coordination activities. The team engages with local CBOs and the DDMA to ensure vulnerable households are identified and prioritised in contingency planning. Resources such as motorboats and dewatering pumps are maintained to be operational in case floodwaters threaten low-lying areas.

#### **15. Jamshoro**

LHDP has reactivated its volunteer lists and is preparing to conduct rapid needs assessments in vulnerable union councils. The district office plays a crucial role in feeding timely data to LHDP's Head Office Emergency Unit, ensuring that local realities inform response planning.

#### **16. Sujawal**

The LHDP office in Sujawal has held meetings with communities residing in the *Kacha* area along the Indus River. This district, which was severely affected during the 2011 floods, remains highly vulnerable. The LHDP team has also engaged with local CSOs and networks to develop a joint action plan for managing the current emergency.

#### **17. Badin**

In Badin, the LHDP team is actively coordinating with all districts where the organisation has community presence. The head office is maintaining its central coordination role to ensure effective linkages and collective response across districts.

### **3.3 What are the IC Membership planned actions?**

#### **Doaba Foundation**

Doaba Foundation is strengthening coordination through regular participation in District Disaster Management Committee (DDMC) meetings, with discussions underway with Rescue 1122 to define roles in WASH and relief camp management. Field monitoring of high-risk areas, including Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and Adam Wahan, will be conducted following each PMD advisory. At the community level, the Doaba Foundation plans to expand awareness initiatives by scaling up DWWF orientations, distributing IEC materials, and issuing bilingual alerts via WhatsApp and voice messages. To improve emergency communication, the District Flood Control Room helpline will be publicised through mosques and loudspeakers, supported by weekly checks to ensure accessibility. For staff and volunteer preparedness, refresher training on evacuation, first aid, and WASH practices is scheduled with Rescue 1122 in early September. In addition, the Foundation is enhancing its information management system through the development of a structured daily SitRep template to capture river levels, DF activities, and identified gaps, thereby ensuring transparency and strengthening donor engagement.

#### **HELP Foundation**

HELP Foundation is actively pursuing its comprehensive response framework, strategically aligning its available resources with anticipated flood scenarios across Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan, and Bahawalpur, with a clear emphasis on vulnerable populations and coordinated efforts with governmental bodies. The organisation maintains crucial supplies, including health and hygiene kits, mosquito nets, plastic sheeting, hand pumps, jerry cans, and torch lights, ready for immediate deployment in the most severely affected districts.

A community-based early warning system (EWS) is operational across 10 union councils, actively alerting approximately 50 villages to increasing flood threats using megaphones, loudspeakers, and mobile phones, assisting families in undertaking preparations and relocating to safer zones promptly. Volunteer Deployment, where eighty trained volunteers, comprising 30 women and 50 men, have been deployed to bolster ongoing rescue and relief activities. Evacuation Management, where in Rahim Yar Khan, the Foundation is working alongside authorities to facilitate dignified and orderly evacuations, prioritising the safety of children, women, persons with disabilities, and older individuals, utilising high-speed boats for rapid movement to designated relief areas. For Bahawalpur, the established early warning system is fully operational, providing at-risk communities with timely notifications and essential safety guidance, thereby assisting in the relocation of both residents and livestock to secure locations while upholding order. Provision of food, shelter, and non-food items (NFIs) where plans are in place for the establishment and management of relief camps to offer secure accommodation for flood-impacted households. This includes the distribution of tents and prepared meals, in collaboration with government agencies, as well as the provision of essential NFIs to address immediate needs.

#### **LHDP**

LHDP plans to address the evolving flood situation through several key actions. They will activate their Emergency Response (ER) unit and coordinate with District Disaster Management Authorities (DDMAs) across nine affected districts. Additionally, LHDP will engage with local stakeholders, philanthropies, and both national and local NGOs to ensure a collaborative response. To understand the immediate needs, they will initiate rapid assessments. A listing of potential volunteers will be compiled to support data collection and response efforts. Finally, LHDP will share daily situational reports with all relevant parties to keep them informed.

#### **Indus Consortium**

Alongside the humanitarian assistance provided by its member organisations, Indus Consortium is leading advocacy and campaigning efforts to ensure that the voices of affected communities are heard at every level. The IC team is highlighting its members' work in media and other humanitarian forums. IC is also advocating for effective relief camp management and accelerated rehabilitation of displaced populations, ensuring that recovery efforts are not only swift but also equitable and accountable.

### **3.4 What are the planned actions of other stakeholders?**

The Deputy Commissioner of Muzaffargarh, accompanied by the District Police, conducted visits to riverine villages to oversee the situation and provide guidance to local communities regarding evacuation measures.

The Commissioner of Dera Ghazi Khan Division visited Muzaffargarh and convened meetings with relevant line departments. He informed that an inflow of more than 700,000 cusecs of water is anticipated. To safeguard the city, a controlled breach of the flood

protection bund has been planned. Breach points have been identified, and all necessary arrangements for blasting have been completed.

The Additional Deputy Commissioner (Revenue) undertook field visits to Chandar Bhan Nala and the Rangpur flood protection bund to inspect the ongoing work related to filling rain-induced cracks.

Under the supervision of Deputy Commissioner Dr. Lubna Nazir, a total of 24 relief camps have been established across District Lodhran to provide shelter, food, and medical assistance to potentially displaced families. These camps have been stocked with essential supplies, and staff have been mobilised to ensure the timely delivery of services.

## 4.0 Policy Asks

On behalf of Indus Consortium and its member organisations, including Doaba Foundation, HELP Foundation, and LHDP, we urge the international community, donors, and aid agencies to strengthen disaster response mechanisms by adopting the following actions:

1. Donor and aid agencies should prioritise supporting local NGOs, CSOs, rights-based organisations, and humanitarian actors to lead disaster response efforts. Local and national NGOs in Pakistan are deeply rooted within communities, fully aware of local issues, contexts, and needs, and are sensitive to cultural norms. The localisation will result in rapid mobilisation of relief efforts.
2. We call upon international donors and governments (e.g., DEC-UK, ECHO, BuZa, GAC, BMZ, etc.) to require that all international organisations applying for donor grants must include local civil society organisations as **co-applicants**, rather than passive recipients of funds. Such an approach will strengthen financial transparency and accountability in humanitarian responses, while also opening up more leadership and operational space for local civil society organisations.
3. We urge international donors (e.g., DEC-UK, FCDO, ECHO, BuZa, GAC, BMZ, etc.) to open their funding calls to local NGOs rather than restricting eligibility to international organisations. Allowing local NGOs to submit proposals directly will foster more inclusive, accountable, and locally led humanitarian responses, in line with the Istanbul Declaration of 2016.

## 5.0 Request for Support

### Gujranwala and Muzaffargarh

- Uncooked food rations for affected households.
- Safe drinking water through bottled water, purification tablets, or filtration units.
- Emergency sanitation facilities (portable latrines, desludging services).
- Basic hygiene kits (soap, sanitary pads, water containers, mosquito nets).
- Temporary shelter materials such as tents, tarpaulins, and mats.
- Livestock support, including fodder and veterinary assistance.
- De-watering equipment and services to clear flooded essential infrastructure.
- Logistical support (transport vehicles, fuel, boats) for outreach in inundated areas.
- Technical expertise in rapid assessments, WASH, and shelter management.
- Volunteer engagement to assist in field operations and community mobilisation.

### Lodhran:

Considering the evolving flood situation in District Lodhran, the following are priority areas:

- **Hygiene kits** (soap, sanitary pads, towels, detergent, toothpaste, etc.) – 1,000 kits for vulnerable households.
- **Water treatment supplies** (chlorine tablets, jerrycans) – 2,000 household sets.
- **Ration packs** (flour, rice, pulses, oil, sugar, salt, tea) – 1,000 family packs.

- **Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)** for responders – 200 life jackets, 200 raincoats, 200 pairs of boots.
- **Machinery & equipment** to reinforce embankments at Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and other vulnerable points – 2 excavators, 4 dumpers.
- **Mobile water purification units** – 5 units to serve flood-affected riverine communities.
- **Transport support** – 2 trucks (10-ton capacity) for relief item distribution and evacuation

The HELP Foundation in southern Punjab and LHDP in Sindh are prioritising the protection of rural livelihoods, particularly livestock, as floods continue to evolve, and there is a window of opportunity for Sindh province. The Consortium seeks resources to provide fodder for at least **20,000 livestock** and to extend veterinary services, including vaccination and deworming, to sustain the livelihoods of flood-affected households. HELP Foundation urgently seeks support to expand its flood response across three districts of Punjab. While resources have already been mobilised, the scale of needs on the ground far exceeds current financial capacity. We, therefore, request financial support to deliver essential aid, including food, water, shelter, health services, and livelihood protection to tens of thousands of affected families.

### Logistical Support

We are currently operating with 10 fibreglass motorboats and 60 dewatering pumps across Punjab and Sindh Provinces. Moreover, we have a network of riverine communities organised into village organisations and river-level forums at the district level. To expand its reach and effectiveness, IC members require an enlarged fleet of **10 boats and 50 dewatering pumps**, along with sufficient financial resources to hire trucks and vehicles suitable for rural terrain, as well as **warehousing facilities** to ensure the timely and efficient delivery of relief items to cut-off communities.
