1.0 Background

The <u>Laar Humanitarian and Development Programme (LHDP)</u>, the <u>HELP Foundation</u>, and the <u>Doaba Foundation</u> jointly established the <u>Indus Consortium for Humanitarian, Environmental, and Development Initiatives</u> (IC) in 2008 as a platform for organisations to coordinate humanitarian response, improve surge capacity and work together among the three founding organisations and other likeminded organisations mainly in humanitarian and climate resilience sectors.

Doaba Foundation: Doaba Foundation has extensive experience in implementing projects of varying scales across Punjab. Since 2003, it has successfully delivered over 145 projects of varying sizes, with a total financial portfolio of approximately PKR 4,500 million.

HELP Foundation: HELP Foundation focuses on humanitarian response, climate resilience, and WASH sectors in Punjab. Over the past decade, HELP Foundation has implemented 67 projects valued at approximately PKR 2,410.51 million.

Laar Humanitarian & Development Programme (LHDP):

LHDP primarily operates in Sindh. The organisation's focus is on humanitarian programme (preparedness, response, anticipatory actions, recovery and rehabilitation phases), climate resilience, and WASH (both in humanitarian and development contexts). With extensive experience, LHDP has completed 76 projects with a total budget of approximately PKR 1,720 million.

The platform approach, as manifested in the IC, brought together the three founding organisations to build reliable surge capacity in the event of mega humanitarian crises and synergised their effectiveness. The three founding organisations finally registered IC as a legal entity under the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) under Section 42 of the Companies Ordinance.

The IC, as a humanitarian platform of three founding organisations, is currently responding to the 2025 floods in Punjab Province and is engaged in preparatory work in Sindh Province.

2.0 Key Points of the Previous Report

The last SitRep highlighted the Indus Consortium's joint activation of emergency mechanisms in response to the 2025 floods. Doaba Foundation led anticipatory and post-trigger actions in Punjab districts including Gujranwala, Sialkot, Muzaffargarh, and Jhang, where early evacuations benefitted over 14,600 people and urgent needs such as food, safe water, sanitation, and shelter were identified. HELP Foundation scaled up preparedness in Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan, and Bahawalpur through community-based early warning systems that reached 50 villages and by mobilising 80 trained volunteers. In Sindh, LHDP allocated PKR 1 million from its own funds, activated an Emergency Response Unit, and began rapid assessments in nine vulnerable districts while maintaining a stockpile of boats, pumps, megaphones, and water testing kits.

The report also underlined major humanitarian gaps—particularly food, safe drinking water, sanitation, temporary shelter, and protection of rural livelihoods, with special emphasis on livestock. Collectively, IC members committed to reaching around 6,200 households with food and WASH services and 10,000 households with shelter and NFIs. The Consortium reiterated that coordination must remain under district and provincial authorities, with international actors supporting rather than substituting local systems. It further called on donors and civil society to urgently step in with financial, logistical, and technical support to help scale the response in line with the severity of needs.

3.0 Situational Update

3.1 General Situational Update

According to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) Monsoon Situation Report No. 68¹, the recent wave of floods in Pakistan (June 26 to September 01, 2025) has resulted in 863 fatalities, including 500 men, 131 women and 232 children, while 1,147 people have been injured, comprising 560 men, 281 women and 306 children (NDMA, 2025). Additionally, 9,166 households have been partially or fully damaged. The floods have also washed away approximately 671.25 kilometres of roads, destroyed 239 bridges, and resulted in the loss of 6,180 livestock. NDMA has warned that Urban flooding is expected in Lahore, Gujranwala and Gujrat divisions during the next three days. The most severely affected districts in Punjab where IC members are operational comprise Sialkot, Narowal, Wazirabad, Lahore, and Sheikhupura. Furthermore, as per available information, Mirpur, Kotlin, and Jhelum valley in AJ&K have also suffered significant damage. Nevertheless, in Gilgit-Baltistan, most fatalities occurred in mountainous areas where communities were affected by landslides or flash floods. The communities across Chiniot, Kasur, Nankana Sahib, Sheikhupura and Okara in Punjab are suffering from casualties, injuries, widespread house damage, and significant livestock losses as a result of flash floods and heavy rains. PDMA Sindh has warned that the River Indus at Guddu and Sukkur is expected to attain very high flood on 4th to 5th September².

3.2 Our Situational Update

Doaba Foundation is closely monitoring and working with humanitarian organisations in Punjab. On August 31 2025, Division Gujranwala was severely affected by heavy rainfall, further exacerbating existing flood-related challenges in Tehsil Wazirabad. In response, Doaba Foundation, in collaboration with the Social Welfare Department of Gujranwala and the District Government, conducted an urgent needs assessment and initiated registration of flood-affected individuals under the READY Pakistan and START Network's Disaster Risk Financing (DRF) mechanism. A total of 107 beneficiaries were registered to receive targeted humanitarian support. As part of this intervention, three Disaster Risk Management (DRM) Committees were established in Union Councils Winjo Wali and Mansoor Wali (covering Moazas Basti Behram, Basti Nawangara, and Kot Kahlwan) to strengthen community-led resilience and disaster preparedness. Beneficiary registration also included the identification of households for food ration packages (48 HHs) and women for Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) and hygiene kits (59 women), ensuring that gender-sensitive and inclusive needs are prioritised. These efforts reflect Doaba Foundation's proactive and inclusive approach, emphasising timely mobilisation of resources, dignity in humanitarian assistance, and resilience-building among vulnerable groups, including women and persons with disabilities. Looking ahead, a coordination meeting is scheduled for September 1 2025, chaired by the Divisional Director of Social

Welfare and Bait-ul-Maal, to further align strategies with NGOs and enhance joint relief, rehabilitation, and recovery efforts across the affected areas of Gujranwala Division.

HELP Foundation has launched an immediate flood response in District Rajanpur, where riverine communities are under severe threat due to rising waters in the Indus River. Rapid needs assessments are underway in flood-prone union councils, while evacuation support is being provided to families relocating from vulnerable riverbeds to safer areas. The Foundation is working in close coordination with the District Administration, DDMA Rajanpur, and Rescue 1122 to facilitate timely rescue and relief operations and is actively engaging with UN-OCHA and other humanitarian partners, including participation in the coordination meeting convened at OCHA's request and hosted by Islamic Relief in Rajanpur. Field teams are collecting data on displaced households to identify urgent needs in food, shelter, safe drinking water, and health services. Volunteers are also assisting in the relocation of women, children, and elderly persons to safer shelters, ensuring that immediate humanitarian needs are addressed in a coordinated and effective manner.

LHDP is actively participating in coordination meetings organised by government bodies and humanitarian forums. Recognising the urgency of the situation, LHDP has initiated a rapid humanitarian response focusing on rescue, shelter, WASH, food, and medical assistance. To support this, the organisation has allocated PKR 1 million from its own funds and established an Emergency Response Unit (ERU) at the Head Office level. A rapid assessment is being conducted in seven highly vulnerable districts to identify at-risk communities and their immediate needs. Focal persons have been designated in these districts to monitor the situation and share real-time information with the ERU in Badin through a dedicated WhatsApp group. LHDP is also compiling a roster of potential volunteers to support data collection and response activities. In parallel, coordination mechanisms have been established with PDMA Sindh and respective DDMAs. The organisation is maintaining emergency stockpiles, including three motorboats, eleven dewatering pumps, twenty megaphones, and water testing kits. LHDP is also engaging with community organisations and local structures to strengthen early warning systems with the support of affected communities and DDMAs. Furthermore, situation reports are being shared on a daily basis with national and international stakeholders to ensure transparency and alignment in the response.

The district-wise details are the following:

1. Gujranwala

Doaba Foundation is actively responding to the floods in Gujranwala through preparedness and early action interventions with support from the Start Network (UK). Ongoing efforts include coordination meetings, rapid assessments, and field visits in Union Council Mansoor Wali. The assessments have highlighted urgent needs such as food rations, safe drinking water, emergency sanitation, hygiene promotion with distribution of hygiene kits, temporary shelter, livestock fodder, and dewatering of critical infrastructure. Despite challenges in household-level data collection, the Foundation is closely coordinating with government departments to ensure accurate beneficiary identification and to enable scalability of the response. District authorities have been highly cooperative, and Doaba Foundation encourages all humanitarian actors, particularly philanthropists, to align their efforts with the local administration to ensure a unified and effective humanitarian response.

2. Muzaffargarh

Muzaffargarh remains on an exceptionally high flood alert as the Chenab River continues to rise, triggering mass evacuations from vulnerable low-lying areas. Relief and response operations are being scaled up under the direct supervision of the district administration, with active support from provincial authorities and humanitarian organisations. On September 1, the Deputy Commissioner (DC) of Muzaffargarh chaired a high-level coordination meeting with NGOs to streamline the relief effort. Specific responsibilities were assigned, particularly focusing on the management of relief camps and the provision of cooked meals to displaced families. The Doaba Foundation has been entrusted with managing cooked food distribution at the Jhalrain Shumali Boys High School relief camp. Implementation of this responsibility begins immediately, aligned with the district's broader response plan. So far, 18 relief camps have been established across the district, providing food, shelter, sanitation, medical care, and livestock support. More than 1,500 police personnel and district officials are on the ground, assisting with evacuations, camp management, and maintaining security. Following the ground situation, the floodwaters have inundated dozens of villages in Jatoi, Alipur, and Khairpur, with breaches in local embankments forcing communities to evacuate urgently. Displaced populations are being relocated to designated relief camps, where NGOs, including the Doaba Foundation, will provide cooked meals and other essential services under the coordinated district plan. The Doaba Foundation, in close coordination with the District Government, the Social Welfare Department, and the NHN Network, has been actively engaged in the flood response. Together with partner NGOs, the following critical interventions have been undertaken:

- 22 flood relief camps have been declared and notified.
- NGOs have been assigned specific camps for cooked food distribution starting from September 2.
- Allocated Jhalrain Shumali Boys High School camp for cooked food provision; supporting WASH facilities in 22 flood relief camps
- It is compulsory for all NGOs to provide food and all other support requested by the government. If any organisation is not willing to provide support, their NOC will be cancelled by the district Government
- Doaba Foundation will install portable latrines in all 22 camps. First phase: 10 latrines to be established in Jawana Bangla
- Hygiene kit, food hamper, and water distribution will be carried out through the NHN platform, comprising Sajh SYCOPE and Sukh Foundation
- Doaba Foundation will deploy two water bowsers: 1 bowser at the Comprehensive High School and Khurshid Abad School (city side), and one bowser at the downstream side
- Hygiene kits, food hampers, and water will be provided under the NHN platform with Sajh, SYCOP, and Sukh Foundation

3. Jhang

The district is experiencing a critical flood situation, with an overwhelming 900,000 cusecs of water flowing through the Chenab River. To protect lives and infrastructure, the district administration has taken several emergency measures. A controlled breach was made near Rewaz Bridge to reduce pressure on Jhang city and Trimmu Barrage, while a section of the railway line was detonated to redirect floodwaters away from densely populated areas. More than 130 villages have been affected, with 1,358 people and 1,392 animals evacuated to safer locations. In addition, 18 relief camps have been established, and Rescue 1122 teams equipped with boats and medical staff have been deployed at 20 critical sites to support evacuation and emergency response. Amid these efforts, the Chenab Forum, formed under Doaba Foundation's Community-Based Disaster Risk Management (CBDRM) initiative, reported a tragic incident in UC Sultan Baho, where a 60-year-old man drowned in the rising floodwaters of the Chenab River. His body has not yet been recovered, and Rescue 1122 search operations are ongoing. The bereaved family is receiving immediate support with dignity and care, and the case will be documented in upcoming donor briefings.

4. Multan

The district is on high alert as surging waters of the Chenab River are expected to reach the city tonight (August 31) or by early tomorrow morning (September 1 2025). In anticipation, authorities have escalated emergency measures, deploying drones to monitor vulnerable low-lying areas and conducting controlled explosions at five embankments to divert floodwaters away from densely populated neighbourhoods. Deputy Commissioner Wasim Hamad Sindhu has urged residents in flood-prone areas to evacuate to government-run relief camps, stressing that "we cannot fight the water." Despite these precautionary efforts, humanitarian concerns are mounting. Families in affected zones are already reporting acute shortages of food and fodder for livestock. "Our animals are starving, and we are not getting food anywhere else," said local resident Emaan Fatima, capturing the growing anxiety of communities at risk. These voices underscore the pressing need for timely humanitarian assistance as Multan braces for the full impact of the approaching floodwaters.

5. Lodhran

The district is grappling with a severe flood emergency as exceptionally high water levels in the Sutlej River threaten communities along its banks. The district administration has declared an emergency in 40 riverine areas to facilitate the evacuation of residents and livestock to safer locations. Under the supervision of Deputy Commissioner Dr. Lubna Nazir, extensive evacuation operations are underway, with a particular focus on the vulnerable Bait area. Residents are being relocated to established relief camps, where the administration, in coordination with multiple agencies, is working to safeguard the lives and well-being of displaced families. Community solidarity is also emerging as a vital force in the response. Prominent businessman Jahangir Khan Tareen has pledged more than Rs. 20 million to support the rehabilitation of flood-affected families in Lodhran. His contribution will bolster relief and recovery efforts, providing much-needed assistance to communities struggling with the impact of the disaster.

6. Khanewal

The district has been placed on high alert as severe flooding looms from both the Chenab and Ravi rivers. The National Emergency Operations Centre (NEOC) has warned that rising waters are likely to affect multiple Union Councils, placing the district in a highly

vulnerable position. According to the latest flood forecast and river flow updates, floodwaters are moving downstream, with the Ravi River's surge expected to reach Khanewal and its neighboring areas within the next 24–48 hours. The high discharge levels recorded at Head Balloki, combined with the anticipated confluence of the Ravi and Chenab rivers, are projected to intensify flood risks further. In terms of administrative response and preparedness, the Government of Punjab has launched one of its largest-ever evacuation operations. To date, more than 750,000 people have been displaced and nearly 500,000 livestock rescued across flood-affected districts, including Khanewal. Continuous monitoring, structured evacuation planning, and the establishment of relief camps are underway to protect at-risk populations as the situation evolves.

7.Rajanpur

HELP Foundation has launched its immediate flood response in District Rajanpur, where riverine communities are under severe threat from rising Indus River waters. An initial needs assessment is underway in flood-prone Union Councils to determine priority requirements. Families living along vulnerable riverbeds are receiving evacuation support, with HELP Foundation working in close coordination with the District Administration and Rescue 1122 to facilitate rescue and relief operations. The organisation is also maintaining regular coordination with UN-OCHA and actively participating in humanitarian forums, including the coordination meeting convened by Islamic Relief at Rajanpur on OCHA's request. HELP Foundation field teams have begun data collection on displaced households to identify immediate needs in food, shelter, safe drinking water, and health services. Formal coordination channels have been established with DDMA Rajanpur to ensure a synchronised response. In parallel, HELP Foundation volunteers are providing direct support in the relocation of women, children, and elderly persons to designated safer shelters.

8. Rahim Yar Khan

HELP Foundation has issued flood alerts along the Indus River and activated its Anticipatory Actions Plan, supported by the START Network. Key actions include the mobilisation of trained volunteers across high-risk Union Councils and the dissemination of early warning messages through community networks, mosques, and street announcements. The Foundation is closely coordinating with the District Administration following the imposition of Section 144, which restricts settlements in flood-prone riverbeds.

Recent updates indicate that volunteers are actively assisting vulnerable families with safe evacuation before water levels rise further. HELP Foundation teams are also gathering household-level data to enable rapid targeting for emergency support in food, WASH, and shelter. Continuous information-sharing is maintained with DDMA Rajanpur and humanitarian partners to ensure a coordinated and timely response.

9. Bahawalpur

Communities along the River Sutlej and downstream of Panjnad face a heightened risk of flooding due to upstream water releases and heavy monsoon inflows. HELP Foundation is actively engaged in Bahawalpur, working closely with community-based organisations in its project areas near Sutlej and Panjnad. Trained volunteer teams have been activated to support the safe evacuation of vulnerable households. Ongoing awareness campaigns focus on safe evacuation procedures, livestock protection, and water safety measures. Volunteers are currently assisting families in riverine settlements to relocate to designated safe shelters. HELP Foundation teams remain in close coordination with DDMA Bahawalpur to ensure effective relief interventions. Meanwhile, community-level assessments are underway to identify urgent needs in food, shelter, safe drinking water, and sanitation kits.

10. Dadu

The local office is closely working with community volunteers to identify vulnerable households and coordinate with the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA). The team also supports preparedness by keeping dewatering pumps and motorboats ready for deployment.

11. Qamber-Shahdadkot

The LHDP focal person is on board and has established a trained volunteer team to support response efforts. An early warning system has been activated, and a dedicated community WhatsApp group has been created to ensure real-time information sharing.

LHDP is maintaining close coordination with existing Community Organizations (COs) and local activists, providing daily updates on the evolving flood situation. A rapid needs assessment is currently underway and is expected to be completed within one day. Meanwhile, LHDP teams are in continuous coordination with the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) to align response actions.

12. Larkana

LHDP has mobilised community groups and volunteers to reactivate various committees in preparation for the anticipated floods in the district. The humanitarian department of LHDP is closely coordinating with the DDMA and participating in regular meetings to ensure the timely sharing of early warning information with communities. The LHDP Program Manager, Mr. Sawan Khaskhali, is based in Larkana and is closely monitoring the evolving flood situation in northern Sindh.

13. Khairpur

LHDP has mobilised its volunteer network and remains engaged with district authorities to ensure the timely dissemination of flood alerts. The office contributes to preparedness by coordinating with local partners, assisting communities in identifying safe evacuation routes, and maintaining essential response equipment.

14. Sukkur

LHDP is supporting both preparedness and coordination activities. The team engages with local CBOs and the DDMA to ensure vulnerable households are identified and prioritised in contingency planning. Resources such as motorboats and dewatering pumps are maintained to be operational in case floodwaters threaten low-lying areas.

15. Jamshoro

LHDP has reactivated its volunteer lists and is preparing to conduct rapid needs assessments in vulnerable union councils. The district office plays a crucial role in feeding timely data to LHDP's Head Office Emergency Unit, ensuring that local realities inform response planning.

16. Sujawal

The LHDP office in Sujawal has held meetings with communities residing in the *Kacha* area along the Indus River. This district, which was severely affected during the 2011 floods, remains highly vulnerable. The LHDP team has also engaged with local CSOs and networks to develop a joint action plan for managing the current emergency.

17. Badin

In Badin, the LHDP team is actively coordinating with all districts where the organisation has community presence. The head office is maintaining its central coordination role to ensure effective linkages and collective response across districts.

3.3 What are the IC Membership planned actions?

Doaba Foundation

Doaba Foundation is strengthening its coordination efforts through regular participation in DDMC meetings, with ongoing discussions with Rescue 1122 to define roles in WASH and relief camp management. Field monitoring of high-risk areas, including Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and Adam Wahan, will be conducted following each PMD advisory. At the community level, the Foundation is expanding awareness initiatives by scaling up DWWF orientations, distributing IEC materials, and disseminating bilingual alerts via WhatsApp and voice messages. To improve emergency communication, the District Flood Control Room helpline will be publicised through mosques and loudspeakers, with weekly checks to ensure accessibility. For staff and volunteer preparedness, refresher training on evacuation, first aid, and WASH practices has been scheduled in collaboration with Rescue 1122 in early September. In parallel, the Foundation is enhancing its information management system through the introduction of a structured daily SitRep template to capture river levels, Doaba Foundation activities, and operational gaps, ensuring transparency and stronger donor engagement. At the community level, the Foundation plans to expand awareness by scaling up DWWF orientations, distributing IEC materials, and sending bilingual alerts via WhatsApp and voice messages. To improve emergency communication, the District Flood Control Room helpline will be publicised through mosques and loudspeakers, with weekly checks ensuring accessibility.

HELP Foundation

In District Rajanpur, HELP Foundation is preparing to distribute cooked meals to evacuees at designated safe sites, with initial support of PKR 250,000 contributed by an individual philanthropist. Efforts are underway to mobilise additional resources to expand this initiative. An Immediate Needs Assessment will be carried out to identify the urgent requirements of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs). The Foundation will also continue to support the evacuation of flood-prone communities through boat services and ensure access to safe drinking water for affected families via water tanker supplies. In District Rahimyar Khan and Bahawalpur, HELP Foundation is prioritising coordination with authorities through regular engagement with district administrations to align response efforts. Plans are in place for early warning dissemination, including continuous sharing of updated flood alerts and advisories with vulnerable communities. Furthermore, the Foundation is activating its trained volunteer network to assist families in preparedness, evacuation, and immediate response activities in disaster-prone areas.

LHDP

LHDP is preparing to address the evolving flood situation through a series of key actions. The organisation will activate its Emergency Response (ER) unit and maintain close coordination with District Disaster Management Authorities (DDMAs) across nine affected districts. Engagement with local stakeholders, philanthropists, and national and local NGOs is planned to ensure a collaborative and well-resourced response. To identify priority needs, rapid assessments are underway and expected to be completed within one day. In parallel, LHDP is compiling a volunteer roster to support data collection, evacuation, and response activities. An early warning system is already active, with daily information-sharing facilitated through Community Organisations (COs), local activists, and community networks. LHDP will also provide daily situation reports to all relevant parties, ensuring transparency and effective coordination of relief efforts.

Indus Consortium

Indus Consortium has established a central hub to ensure coordinated emergency response, while maintaining close coordination with the Provincial Disaster Management Authorities (PDMAs) and UNOCHA to align with government guidelines and alerts in its opertaions. In this context, the Consortium has also developed a Joint Humanitarian Strategy for Flood 2025, which is scheduled to be launched virtually on 3rd September 2025 at 3:00 PM.

3.4 What are the planned actions of other stakeholders?

The Doaba Foundation is reinforcing its coordination role through regular participation in District Disaster Management Committee (DDMC) meetings, with discussions underway with Rescue 1122 to define roles in WASH services and relief camp management. The Foundation will also conduct field monitoring of high-risk areas, including Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and Adam Wahan, following each advisory issued by the Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD).

The HELP Foundation has completed stakeholder mapping to ensure clarity of roles in the ongoing response. The District Administration/DDMA is leading overall coordination, establishing relief camps, mobilising evacuation machinery, and ensuring law and order. Rescue 1122 is providing boats, emergency rescue services, medical first aid, and support for population movement to safe shelters. UN-OCHA and partners are coordinating humanitarian actors, supporting needs assessments, and facilitating resource mobilisation for food, WASH, and shelter interventions. The Pakistan Red Crescent Society (PRCS) is expected to distribute relief kits, tents, and hygiene supplies, in addition to running medical camps. Local philanthropists and community networks are also contributing by providing food and water to evacuees in camps and along evacuation routes.

The LHDP has reported several developments in coordination and response. Rescue 1122 is on high alert, with 178 boats deployed across riverine districts. People's Primary Healthcare Initiative (PPHI) has established emergency medical camps to cater to displaced populations. The Pakistan Navy has also been engaged to support large-scale rescue operations, as confirmed by the Chief Minister of Sindh. On the coordination front, WaterAid Pakistan has approached LHDP to collaborate on assessment activities, while a meeting with ACTED Pakistan has been held to explore joint response interventions, particularly in the area of medical assistance. In parallel, DDMAs continue to play a central role in convening coordination meetings with key stakeholders to streamline the overall response.

4.0 Policy Asks

On behalf of Indus Consortium and its member organisations, including Doaba Foundation, HELP Foundation, and LHDP, we urge the the provincial governments for the following actions:

The recent floods have severely affected vulnerable populations across multiple districts of Punjab. While immediate relief is critical, the Government must go beyond emergency assistance and establish a dedicated financing mechanism to ensure that recovery and rehabilitation efforts adequately address community needs. In this regard, the Punjab Government should:

- Provide relief on upcoming agricultural taxes to support affected farming communities.
- Offer a three-month waiver on electricity bills for households consuming up to 200 units per month.

These measures will help reduce the economic burden on flood-affected families and support their early recovery.

5.0 Request for Support

Gujranwala and Muzaffargarh

- Uncooked food rations for affected households.
- Safe drinking water through bottled water, purification tablets, or filtration units.
- Emergency sanitation facilities (portable latrines, desludging services).
- Basic hygiene kits (soap, sanitary pads, water containers, mosquito nets).
- Temporary shelter materials such as tents, tarpaulins, and mats.
- Livestock support, including fodder and veterinary assistance.
- De-watering equipment and services to clear flooded essential infrastructure.
- Logistical support (transport vehicles, fuel, boats) for outreach in inundated areas.
- Technical expertise in rapid assessments, WASH, and shelter management.
- Volunteer engagement to assist in field operations and community mobilisation

Lodhran:

Considering the evolving flood situation in District Lodhran, the following are priority areas:

- Hygiene kits (soap, sanitary pads, towels, detergent, toothpaste, etc.) 1,000 kits for vulnerable households.
- Water treatment supplies (chlorine tablets, jerrycans) 2,000 household sets.
- Ration packs (flour, rice, pulses, oil, sugar, salt, tea) 1,000 family packs.
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for responders 200 life jackets, 200 raincoats, 200 pairs of boots.
- Machinery & equipment to reinforce embankments at Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and other vulnerable points 2 excavators, 4 dumpers.
- **Mobile water purification units** *5 units* to serve flood-affected riverine communities.
- **Transport support** 2 trucks (10-ton capacity) for relief item distribution and evacuation.

The HELP Foundation in southern Punjab and LHDP in Sindh are prioritising the protection of rural livelihoods, particularly livestock, as floods continue to evolve, and there is a window of opportunity for Sindh province. The Consortium seeks resources to provide fodder for at least **20,000 livestock** and to extend veterinary services, including vaccination and deworming, to sustain the livelihoods of flood-affected households. HELP Foundation urgently seeks support to expand its flood response across three districts of Punjab. While resources have already been mobilised, the scale of needs on the ground far exceeds current financial capacity. We, therefore, request financial support to deliver essential aid, including food, water, shelter, health services, and livelihood protection to tens of thousands of affected families.

Logistical Support

We are currently operating with 10 fibreglass motorboats and 60 dewatering pumps across Punjab and Sindh Provinces. Moreover, we have a network of riverine communities organised into village organisations and river-level forums at the district level. To expand its reach and effectiveness, IC members require an enlarged fleet of 10 boats and 50 dewatering pumps, along with sufficient financial resources to hire trucks and vehicles suitable for rural terrain, as well as warehousing facilities to ensure the timely and efficient delivery of relief items to cut-off communities.
