1.0 Background

The <u>Laar Humanitarian and Development Programme (LHDP)</u>, the <u>HELP Foundation</u>, and the <u>Doaba Foundation</u> jointly established the <u>Indus Consortium for Humanitarian, Environmental, and Development Initiatives</u> (IC) in 2008 as a platform for organisations to coordinate humanitarian response, improve surge capacity and work together among the three founding organisations and other likeminded organisations mainly in humanitarian and climate resilience sectors.

Doaba Foundation: Doaba Foundation has extensive experience in implementing projects of varying scales across Punjab. Since 2003, it has successfully delivered over 145 projects of varying sizes, with a total financial portfolio of approximately PKR 4,500 million.

HELP Foundation: HELP Foundation focuses on humanitarian response, climate resilience, and WASH sectors in Punjab. Over the past decade, HELP Foundation has implemented 67 projects valued at approximately PKR 2,410.51 million.

Laar Humanitarian & Development Programme (LHDP):

LHDP primarily operates in Sindh. The organisation's focus is on humanitarian programme (preparedness, response, anticipatory actions, recovery and rehabilitation phases), climate resilience, and WASH (both in humanitarian and development contexts). With extensive experience, LHDP has completed 76 projects with a total budget of approximately PKR 1,720 million.

The platform approach, as manifested in the IC, brought together the three founding organisations to build reliable surge capacity in the event of mega humanitarian crises and synergised their effectiveness. The three founding organisations finally registered IC as a legal entity under the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) under Section 42 of the Companies Ordinance.

The IC, as a humanitarian platform of three founding organisations, is currently responding to the 2025 floods in Punjab Province and is engaged in preparatory work in Sindh Province.

2.0 Key Points of the Previous Report

The Indus Consortium and members Doaba Foundation, HELP Foundation, and LHDP are delivering joint emergency responses. **Doaba Foundation** is providing safe water for 31,000 people daily, 44 portable latrines, nutrition and psychosocial support, and is planning integrated household kit distribution with WHH. **HELP Foundation** has treated 1,619 patients in medical camps, distributed food, and delivered WASH interventions in Rajanpur, Rahimyar Khan, and Bahawalpur. In Sindh, **LHDP** has set up an Emergency Response Unit, conducted a rapid survey of 43,000 households, initiated dewatering, and strengthened early warning systems with DDMAs. Relief operations are reinforced by government authorities, PDMA, and Rescue 1122, with support from UNOCHA, WFP, Start Network, CBM, and WaterAid. However, urgent needs remain in food, safe water, temporary toilets, hygiene kits, shelter, livestock care, and dewatering equipment. The Consortium urges rapid delivery of Punjab Government compensation (PKR 1m for destroyed, PKR 0.5m for damaged houses), issued in women's names to strengthen resilience and rights. **The Indus Consortium** continues to advocate for a coordinated, inclusive, and dignity-centered response, while mobilizing urgent support for early recovery.

3.0 Situational Update

3.1 General Situational Update

According to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) Monsoon Situation Report No. 86¹, the floods in Pakistan between June 26 and September 19, 2025, have caused 1,006 deaths, including 568 men, 163 women, and 275 children. A further 1,063 people were injured (450 men, 292 women, and 321 children). The disaster has damaged or destroyed 12,569 households, washed away 1,981.37 kilometres of roads, destroyed 239 bridges, and resulted in the loss of 6,509 livestock.

Refer to Weekly Weather Outlook dated 30 September, Ministry of Defense (Defense Division) Pakistan MET Department, Flood Forecasting Division, weekly significant weather outlook for river catchments (1st Oct-7th October 2025) indicates no significant rainfall is expected up to 4th October. A fresh westerly weather system is likely to affect upper parts of the country from 5th of October. Yesterday's depression over southeast Gujarat has weakened into well marked low and today lies over west Gujart (India). The River Indus at Kotri is in Medium Flood level and falling.²

Since late June, over 6.9 million people have been affected by heavy monsoon rains, with 3.5 million displaced. Of these, 4.7 million are in Punjab Province, 1.6 million in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), 356,000 in Gilgit-Baltistan, and 185,000 in Sindh. On 26 September, the Pakistan Meteorological Department issued a dengue alert, warning of a significantly heightened risk of a severe outbreak between 20 September and 5 December. The Government of Punjab has launched a comprehensive damage and loss assessment across all flood-affected districts, expected to be completed within 30 days. In Sindh, flood forecasting data indicates that the Kotri Barrage is experiencing medium flood levels, while the Guddu and Sukkur Barrages have receded to low flood levels.³ Furthermore, according to PDMA Sindh's Flood Emergency Situation Report of 25 September 2025, a total of 15 districts are at risk, with 625,411 people affected and 195,843 displaced.⁴

3.2 Our Situational Update

Doaba Foundation (DF) is coordinating and liaising through participation in District Disaster Management Committee (DDMC) meetings to align flood preparedness measures. <u>Field Assessments</u>: DF teams visited vulnerable sites, including Chamb Mor, to review embankments, settlements, and potential evacuation routes. <u>Rescue 1122 Engagement</u>: A dedicated meeting with Rescue 1122 Lodhran was held to plan joint evacuation support and safe-boat access in the event of riverine flooding. <u>Community Preparedness:</u>

Through the Doaba Women Welfare Forum (DWWF), awareness sessions were conducted to reactivate flood emergency preparedness, ensuring women leaders and community focal persons are ready for mobilisation. Emergency Communication: The flood emergency control room contact number was updated and widely shared with communities for direct access. Resource Review: A debriefing on DF's contingency stock was carried out to assess hygiene kits, water purification supplies, PPE, and logistics resources. Planned Action: Procurement and pre-positioning of chlorine tablets, jerrycans, and family hygiene kits in high-risk union councils (Adam Wahan, Qureshiwala, Jhoke Janan).

HELP Foundation and its members have been actively engaged in the flood emergency response in District Rajanpur, Punjab, while also extending coordination support in other provinces. In Rajanpur, the Foundation has established medical camps that have already provided treatment and medicines

to 1,619 patients, alongside initial WASH interventions such as the chlorination of water sources and hygiene awareness sessions in camps. Relief camps have been set up to deliver food and medical assistance,



and partnerships have been strengthened with the district administration and volunteers to ensure a well-coordinated response. Currently, the medical camps are treating an average of 200 patients daily, with the majority presenting cases of diarrhea, fever, and skin-related diseases. Furthermore, the distribution of clean drinking water has been carried out to meet urgent needs

LHDP has established an Emergency Response Unit was established at the Head Office to coordinate and oversee relief efforts. Dewatering operations were initiated in Union Council Tarai of Taluka Shaheed Fazil Rahoo, while an Initial Rapid Survey Report covering six districts of Sindh was launched and shared with stakeholders. To strengthen field-level coordination, focal persons were appointed in seven districts to monitor the evolving situation and provide regular updates to the Emergency Response Unit in Badin through a dedicated WhatsApp group. Coordination mechanisms were further developed with PDMA Sindh and district-level DDMAs to ensure timely response. In terms of preparedness, emergency stockpiles were maintained, including three motorboats, eleven dewatering pumps, twenty megaphones, and water testing kits. The organization also worked closely with existing community organizations (COs) to establish early warning systems in collaboration with affected communities and DDMAs. In addition, daily situation reports were prepared and shared with stakeholders at both national and international levels to keep partners updated on the response. Furthermore, the LHDP conducted the "Strengthening Anticipation: Pre-Flood Rapid Assessment (2025)" in Sindh to identify risks for riverine communities across six districts: Ghotki, Kashmore, Larkana, Qambar Shahdadkot, Sujawal, and Sukkur. The assessment covered 375 villages, 43,614 households, and 261,684 individuals. Findings and recommendations were launched in a webinar with 52 stakeholders, including NGOs, INGOs, journalists, consortia, and community representatives, who provided valuable

The district-wise details are the following:

1. Gujranwala

In Gujranwala, Doaba Foundation is responding to recent floods through preparedness and early action with support from the Start Network (UK). Assessments in Union Council Mansoor Wali identified urgent needs for food, safe water, sanitation, hygiene kits, temporary shelter, livestock fodder, and de-watering of public facilities. In collaboration with the Social Welfare Department and District Government, de-watering operations were completed at Government High School Khanki and the BHU on 6 September, restoring access to education and health services.

Under READY Pakistan and the START DRF mechanism, relief reached 300 beneficiaries, including the distribution of **325 hygiene & MHM kits** and **325 food ration packages**, prioritizing female-headed households, persons with disabilities, and destitute families. Additional surveys in UC Dilawar highlighted further food and hygiene needs, while six Distribution & Crowd-Controlling Committees were established to ensure transparent relief delivery.

Despite strong coordination with district officials, challenges remain due to gaps in household-level data, limited funding, and unmet WASH and food security needs. Urgent financial support is required to expand assistance to unreached villages, where current resources remain insufficient against the scale of need.

2. Muzaffargarh

Muzaffargarh remains on high flood alert as the Chenab River continues to swell, inundating villages in Jatoi, Alipur, and Khairpur. Doaba Foundation is providing cooked meals at the Jhalrain Shumali Boys High School camp and supporting WASH services across 22 district camps. To date, 44 portable latrines have been installed, and safe drinking water is being supplied daily to 31,000 people. Nutrition support has reached 65 vulnerable individuals, while psycho-social activities for children have been introduced at Jhalrain camp. Doaba is coordinating closely with district authorities, UNOCHA, and NHN partners to strengthen response efforts. However, challenges remain, including bund breaches, unmet WASH and food needs, high displacement, and funding gaps that constrain the expansion of essential services.

Doaba Foundation, in close coordination with the District Government, Social Welfare Department, and the NHN network, has played an active role in the ongoing flood response. In collaboration with partner NGOs, the following activities have been implemented:

3. Jhang

According to FFD Lahore, most key Chenab River stations are reporting normal flow levels, though Panjnad is discharging around 148,850 cusecs. Despite stabilizing levels, District Jhang remains severely affected after peak discharges above 900,000 cusecs inundated villages, croplands, schools, and infrastructure across Tehsils 18-Hazari, Shorkot, and Ahmad Pur Sial, impacting an estimated 2,160 people. To date, 396 people and 1,392 animals have been evacuated, with 18 relief camps established and rescue teams deployed at 20 critical points. Food, water, shelter, health, and WASH services are being provided, supported by partners including Doaba Foundation, which is also preparing a Rapid Needs Assessment with WHH in Ahmad Pur Sial to guide targeted interventions.

Emergency Measures

- 1. A controlled breach of the embankment near Rewaz Bridge was carried out to reduce pressure on Jhang City and Trimmu Barrage.
- 2. A railway line was detonated to redirect floodwaters away from densely populated areas.
- 3. Over 130 villages have been affected, with 1,358 people and 1,392 animals evacuated to safer locations.

4. **18 relief camps** have been established, while Rescue 1122 teams with boats and medical staff are deployed at **20 critical** sites.

Community Tragedy (30 August 2025)

Chenab Forum, established through Doaba Foundation's CBDRM mobilization, reported a drowning in UC Sultan Baho. A 60-year-old man lost his life in rising Chenab waters, and his body has not yet been recovered. Rescue 1122 search operations are ongoing. The affected family is being supported with dignity and care, and the incident will be documented in donor briefings.

4. Multan

In District Multan, flood water receded and the displaced families are returning homes. Multan face severe crop losses, damaged homes, food shortages, and a lack of livestock fodder. Province-wide, the disaster has resulted in **63 deaths**, affected **4.199 million people**, and displaced **2.147 million**, with **412 relief camps**, **492 medical camps**, and more than **27,000 rescue boat trips** recorded. Officials warn that surges in the Chenab River, now nearing critical levels, continue to pose a serious threat, highlighting the urgent need for coordinated support in food, WASH, and livestock assistance. 5. Lodhran

Doaba Foundation, in collaboration with WaterAid Pakistan, is preparing to launch a WASH emergency intervention to complement government-led relief efforts. The intervention will focus on dewatering operations at five waterlogged public sites, distribution of 400 hygiene and menstrual hygiene management (MHM) kits, and provision of 3,000 liters of safe drinking water per day in relief

camps and temporary settlements. In partnership with the District Government, 10 emergency toilets will also be installed in camps. These efforts are designed to reduce health risks, restore essential services, and promote dignity and resilience among flood-affected populations.

6. Khanewal

District Khanewal has been placed on high alert due to severe flooding threats from both the Chenab and Ravi rivers. In response, the Punjab Government has launched one of its largest evacuation operations, displacing more than 750,000 people and rescuing over 500,000 livestock across affected districts, including Khanewal. The affected communities are struggling to return home due to persistently high water levels, while stagnant water is contributing to the spread of waterborne and skin-related diseases.

7.Rajanpur

HELP Foundation has initiated immediate flood response in District Rajanpur where riverine communities are facing severe threats due to rising waters in the Indus River.

8. Rahim Yar Khan

With flood alerts along the Indus River, HELP Foundation activated its Anticipatory Action Plan with START Network support. Volunteers are assisting vulnerable families with safe evacuation, while coordination with District Administration (Section 144 enforcement) and continuous information-sharing with DDMA and partners ensures a timely, coordinated response.

9. Bahawalpur

In the district the communities living along the River Sutlej and downstream of Panjnad are facing a heightened risk of flooding due to water releases and heavy monsoon inflows. HELP Foundation has been actively engaging with community-based organizations in its project areas near the rivers, while maintaining close liaison with the DDMA through regular coordination meetings. Trained volunteer teams have been mobilized to support the safe evacuation of vulnerable households, alongside awareness campaigns focused on evacuation procedures, livestock protection, and water safety. Community forums and women leaders' networks have also been

activated to strengthen preparedness and ensure rapid mobilization. Currently, volunteers are assisting families in riverine settlements to relocate to designated safe shelters, while HELP Foundation teams continue to work closely with the DDMA Bahawalpur to coordinate timely relief interventions.

10. Dadu

The local office is closely working with community volunteers to identify vulnerable households and coordinate with the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA). The team also supports preparedness by keeping dewatering pumps and motorboats ready for deployment.

11. Qamber-Shahdadkot

The LHDP focal person is on board and has established a trained volunteer team to support response efforts. An early warning system has been activated, and a dedicated community WhatsApp group has been created to ensure real-time information sharing. LHDP is maintaining close coordination with existing Community Organizations (COs) and local activists, providing daily updates on the evolving flood situation. A rapid needs assessment is currently underway and is expected to be completed within one day. Meanwhile, LHDP teams are in continuous coordination with the District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) to align response actions.

12. Larkana

A total of 710 families from Katcha areas have been relocated to Karani Bund in Talukas Dokri and Bakrani. So far, no significant assistance has been reported from government authorities or other actors.

13. Khairpur

LHDP has mobilised its volunteer network and remains engaged with district authorities to ensure the timely dissemination of flood alerts. The office contributes to preparedness by coordinating with local partners, assisting communities in identifying safe evacuation routes, and maintaining essential response equipment.

14. Sukkur

LHDP is formulating a strategy to protect affected communities. LHDP is actively engaged at the ground and field level, where 1,045 individuals have been evacuated by DDMA and relocated to stay with relatives in Panu Akal and Sukkur. Considering the severity of the situation, LHDP is formulating its strategy to safeguard affected communities. In the past days, continuous monsoon rains have hit various parts of Sukkur, leaving low-lying areas of the city submerged.

15. Jamshoro

A total of **1,470 families** from Districts Jamshoro and Dadu have relocated to protection bunds. **No support has yet been provided by the government or other actors.**

16. Sujawal

A total of 1,200 families from UC Belo, Daro, and Qadir Dino have been relocated to embankments and government-settled camps, where only basic medical assistance has been provided so far. The DDMA has established 25 tent cities across five talukas Sujawal, Mirpur Bathoro, Shahbandar, Jati, and Kharochan. Meanwhile, populations in Katcha villages remain in place, though many are expected to move toward embankments if the situation worsens.

17. Badin

In District Badin, heavy rainfall combined with breaches in the sub-drains of the Left Bank Outfall Drain (LBOD) has caused extensive agricultural losses. An estimated 4,800 acres of rice crops have been damaged, severely affecting the livelihoods of farming households in the area. The standing water has not only destroyed standing crops but also poses risks of soil degradation and delays in the next planting season. Local communities are reporting significant financial stress, as rice cultivation is a primary source of income and food security in these flood-affected villages. Immediate support is required to drain water from fields, provide seeds and agricultural inputs for replanting, and extend livelihood recovery assistance to farmers who have lost their only source of income.

18. District Ghotki: Around 3,000 families have relocated on a self-help basis to OGDCL Bund, Qadirpur Bund, and Shank Bund. Communities from the Katcha area have also moved an estimated 4,800 livestock to the protection bunds at OGDCL and Qadirpur Loop Bund. Families have begun setting up temporary shelters on their own, with no assistance received so far from government agencies or NGOs.

19. District Kashmore: Overall, 1,300 families from Katcha areas had moved to stay with relatives in Kashmore, Qankhkot, and Shikarpur. As conditions improve, the population is now beginning to return to their villages.

3.3 What are the IC Membership planned actions?

Doaba Foundation

Doaba Foundation has developed a set of targeted, district-level actions to strengthen preparedness, enhance response capacity, and improve coordination with government authorities and humanitarian partners. These actions are designed to ensure coordinated, timely, and dignity-centered response efforts across all operational districts, while addressing critical gaps in funding, resources, and communication.

District Lodhran & Khanewal

- Strengthening coordination through active participation in District Disaster Management Committee (DDMC) meetings.
- Continuing dialogue with **Rescue 1122** to formalize Doaba's support role in **WASH services and relief camp management**, ensuring access to safe water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities in temporary shelters.
- Conducting **field monitoring of high-risk areas** (Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, Adam Wahan) following each Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD) advisory to track flood progression and guide timely response decisions.

District Jhang

- Planned distribution of Integrated Household Kits (kitchen utensils, food supplies, personal hygiene items) to 350 flood-affected households, in partnership with Welthungerhilfe (WHH), to address multi-sectoral household needs.
- Coordinating with local authorities to ensure safe and inclusive relief camp operations, with particular focus on women, children, and persons with disabilities.

District Gujranwala

- Expanding community awareness initiatives through scaled-up DWWF orientations, dissemination of IEC materials, and timely bilingual flood alerts via WhatsApp and automated voice messaging.
- Establishing and strengthening Distribution & Crowd Management Committees in vulnerable union councils to ensure orderly and dignified relief delivery.
- Holding coordination meetings with Divisional Social Welfare and Bait-ul-Maal authorities to align strategies with government-led response priorities.

Cross-District Actions (All Operational Areas)

- Emergency Communication: Publicizing the District Flood Control Room helpline through mosques and loudspeakers to reach rural populations with limited digital access. Weekly checks will ensure hotline functionality.
- Staff & Volunteer Preparedness: Organizing refresher training on evacuation, first aid, and WASH practices in collaboration with Rescue 1122 (scheduled for early September) to strengthen frontline response capacity.
- Information Management: Upgrading Doaba Foundation's system with a structured daily situation report (SitRep) template
 to capture river levels, organizational activities, and humanitarian gaps, improving coordination, transparency, and donor
 engagement.

HELP Foundation

District Rajanpur:

- **Cooked Food Distribution:** Providing cooked meals to evacuees at safe sites, initially supported by PKR 250,000 from an individual philanthropist, with efforts underway to mobilize additional resources.
- Immediate Needs Assessment: Conducting rapid assessments to identify urgent needs of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs).
- Evacuation Support: Facilitating the safe evacuation of flood-prone communities through boat services.

Provision of Safe Drinking Water: Supplying clean water to affected families through water tankers.

District Rahimyar Khan & Bahawalpur:

- Coordination with Authorities: Engaging regularly with district administrations to ensure aligned and effective response efforts
- Early Warning Dissemination: Continuously sharing updated flood alerts and advisories with vulnerable communities.
- **Volunteer Mobilisation:** Activating trained community volunteers to assist families with preparedness, evacuation, and immediate response in high-risk areas.

LHDP

Common Actions Across All Districts (Ghotki, Kashmore, Qamber Shahdadkot, Sukkur, Larkana, Jamshoro, Sujawal, Badin): Focal persons onboarded and volunteer teams formed.

- Early warning systems activated, with daily information shared through COs, local activists, and community networks (including WhatsApp groups where established).
- Regular coordination with DDMAs to align response and preparedness efforts.

District-Specific Actions:

- Qamber Shahdadkot: Early warning system strengthened through creation of a dedicated WhatsApp group for communities.
- **Badin:** Initiated dewatering operations in villages (Taluka Shaheed Fazil Rahoo) in coordination with Union Councils and local government.

Indus Consortium

The Indus Consortium, in partnership with Doaba Foundation, HELP Foundation, and LHDP, has been coordinating joint emergency response efforts in flood-affected areas of Punjab and Sindh. Member organizations are currently conducting needs assessments in Multan, Muzaffargarh, and Rajanpur districts of Punjab to inform the early recovery phase.

3.4 What are the planned actions of other stakeholders?

In districts where Doaba Foundation is active, several government bodies, UN agencies, and humanitarian networks have defined planned actions to complement and coordinate flood response efforts.

Government Authorities (DDMCs, PDMA Punjab, District Administrations, Rescue 1122):

- DDMCs in Lodhran, Khanewal, Jhang, and Gujranwala are leading district-level coordination, assigning NGOs specific responsibilities for relief camp management, food provision, and WASH facilities.
- Rescue 1122 is scaling up search and rescue operations with additional boats, life jackets, and medical first responders at
 critical points. Joint refresher trainings with NGOs, including Doaba Foundation, are planned to strengthen local evacuation
 and first-aid capacity.
- District Administrations are establishing and maintaining relief camps with food, shelter, sanitation, and medical services, while also publicizing helplines and evacuation routes for at-risk communities.
- PDMA Punjab is issuing daily **situation reports and PMD-based flood alerts**, and guiding anticipatory measures such as controlled breaches, bund reinforcement, and deployment of heavy machinery to secure embankments.

UN Agencies & International NGOs (UNOCHA, WHH, UNICEF, WFP, Start Network, CBM):

- UNOCHA is coordinating **Rapid Needs Assessments (RNAs)** with NGOs to standardize data collection on displacement, damages, and urgent needs, while also facilitating information sharing and donor engagement.
- WHH (Welthungerhilfe) is partnering with Doaba Foundation in **Jhang** to distribute **integrated household kits** (kitchen items, food supplies, hygiene kits) to 350 households.
- WFP is planning **food ration distributions** and anticipatory stockpiling in strategic hubs to ensure timely coverage of at-risk populations.
- Start Network and its members are supporting **anticipatory action interventions**, including hygiene kit distribution, dewatering of schools and health facilities, and provision of safe drinking water in relief camps.
- CBM is preparing to support **inclusive WASH and relief interventions** in collaboration with partners, aligned with WaterAid's efforts. Planned actions include hygiene kit distribution, installation of portable latrines, and provision of safe drinking water in camps, with particular attention to the needs of persons with disabilities, women, and children.

The **LHDP** has reported several developments in coordination and response. Several key stakeholders are scaling up their preparedness and response measures to address the evolving flood situation. The coordination revealed the following activities by other stakeholders.

PDMA: Providing stocks of boats, tents, and mosquito nets for humans and livestock to DDMAs.

Rescue 1122: On high alert, with **178 boats deployed** across riverine districts for emergency evacuation and rescue operations.

PPHI: Establishing emergency medical camps in affected districts to provide health services.

Pakistan Navy: Engaged in rescue operations (as per the Chief Minister of Sindh) and operating relief camps in District Sujawal.

DDMAs: Coordinating through stakeholder meetings and establishing relief camps across districts.

Acted Pakistan: Conducting assessments in District Kashmore for the provision of shelter kits, supported by IOM.

4.0 Policy Asks

Early recovery for communities affected by the 2025 floods must prioritize restoring livelihoods for farmers, workers, and small traders; rebuilding homes with resilient materials; and reconstructing health and education facilities. Women and youth who face disproportionate burdens must be placed at the center of recovery, while safe water, sanitation, and hygiene services are secured to avert secondary crises. This is not simply a matter of aid, but of climate justice: Pakistan should not be forced to pay twice—first through destruction, and then through debt.

5.0 Request for Support

Lodhran:

Considering the evolving flood situation in District Lodhran, the following are priority areas:

- Hygiene kits (soap, sanitary pads, towels, detergent, toothpaste, etc.) − 1,000 kits for vulnerable households. Urgent
- Water treatment supplies (chlorine tablets, jerrycans) 2,000 household sets. Urgent
- Ration packs (flour, rice, pulses, oil, sugar, salt, tea) 1,000 family packs. Urgent
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for responders 200 life jackets, 200 raincoats, 200 pairs of boots. Urgent
- **Machinery & equipment** to reinforce embankments at Chamb Mor, Jhoke Janan, and other vulnerable points *2 excavators, 4 dumpers.* **Medium**
- Mobile water purification units 5 units to serve flood-affected riverine communities. Medium
- Transport support 2 trucks (10-ton capacity) for relief item distribution and evacuation. Medium

Muzaffargarh:

Muzaffargarh has been among the hardest-hit districts, facing large-scale displacement and severe livelihood losses. In collaboration with district authorities, Doaba Foundation has established **64 emergency toilets** across three union councils and is providing cooked food at relief camps. However, additional support is urgently needed in the following areas:

- Food Rations: 1,500 household packs (flour, rice, pulses, oil, sugar, salt). Urgent
- Safe Drinking Water: Support for 2,000 households via purification tablets, bottled water, or filtration units. Urgent
- Sanitation Facilities: 100 additional portable toilets for relief camps. Medium
- **Hygiene Kits**: 2,000 kits (soap, sanitary pads, detergent, water containers, mosquito nets), prioritized for households with high numbers of women as per Health Department guidance. **Urgent**
- Shelter Materials: 1,200 sets (tents, tarpaulins, mats, blankets). Medium
- Livestock Support: Fodder for 4,000 animals and vaccination/veterinary care for 1,500 households. Urgent
- De-watering: 8 pumps for schools, BHUs, and critical infrastructure. Medium
- Logistics: 3 trucks, 2 boats, and fuel support to sustain relief operations. Medium

Khanewal:

The district has been placed on high alert due to flood threats from the Chenab and Ravi rivers, affecting multiple union councils. Immediate requirements include:

- Food Rations: 2,000 household packs (flour, rice, pulses, oil, sugar, salt). Urgent
- Safe Drinking Water: For 3,000 households via bottled water, purification tablets, or filtration units. Urgent
- Sanitation Facilities: 150 portable latrines and desludging services in temporary camps. Medium
- Hygiene Kits: 2,500 kits (soap, sanitary pads, towels, water containers, mosquito nets). Urgent
- Shelter Materials: 1,500 sets (tents, tarpaulins, mats, blankets). Medium
- Livestock Support: Fodder for 5,000 animals; vaccination/veterinary services for 2,000 households. Urgent

- De-watering: 10 pumps for schools, BHUs, and public facilities. **Medium**
- Logistics: 4 vehicles, 2 boats, and fuel for outreach in inundated areas. **Medium**
- Technical Expertise: 5 specialists in rapid assessment, WASH, and shelter management. Medium
- Volunteers: 100 trained individuals for evacuation, mobilization, and relief assistance. Medium

HELP Foundation seeks urgent support to strengthen its ongoing humanitarian response in the flood-affected districts of **Rajanpur**, **Rahimyar Khan**, and **Bahawalpur**. In addition to financial contributions, the following areas of support are critical:

Food Security & NFIs

- Dry ration packages and ready-to-eat meals for displaced families. Urgent
- Essential non-food items, including cooking utensils, blankets, and bedding. Urgent

Health & Medical Support

- Emergency medicines for diarrhea, malaria, and skin infections. Urgent
- Deployment of mobile health units to inaccessible areas. Urgent
- Support for medical staff incentives and transport to sustain health services. Urgent

Shelter & WASH

- Tents and temporary shelters for displaced families. Urgent
- Mosquito nets and repellents to reduce malaria risk. Urgent
- Safe drinking water through tankers, purification tablets, and hygiene kits. Urgent
- Technical support for repairing damaged hand pumps and water supply systems. Medium

Logistics & Operations

- Boats, fuel, and transport for evacuation and relief delivery. **Medium**
- Temporary storage facilities for relief items in Rajanpur and other districts. Medium
- Support for establishing a field-level coordination hub. Medium

Livelihood Recovery

- Seeds, fertilizers, and inputs for farmers who lost crops. Medium
- Livestock feed and basic veterinary care. Urgent
- Cash-for-work or short-term income opportunities for affected households. **Medium**

LHDP has identified **funding needs** to support its response activities, including evacuation and transportation, provision of shelter, cooked food, safe drinking water, livestock fodder, and WASH services. Planned actions include:

- Developing proposals to mobilize resources. Medium
- Coordination with donors and partners for rehabilitation support (shelter, WASH, livelihoods, livestock vaccination). Medium
- Ensuring timely and accurate information sharing with all stakeholders to facilitate a coordinated response. Medium

Logistical Support

Doaba Foundation has identified needs <u>technical & logistics</u>: 2 excavators, 4 dumpers for embankments; 5 mobile water purification units; 2 trucks (10-ton) for relief and evacuation. <u>Capacity building</u>: 10 WASH/MHM refresher sessions (250 participants); 5 safeguarding and gender-sensitive response orientations (100 participants). <u>Information & communication</u>: 10 awareness campaigns via FM radio, mosques, and cable networks.

Furthermore, we are currently operating with 10 fibreglass motorboats and 60 dewatering pumps across Punjab and Sindh Provinces. Moreover, we have a network of riverine communities organised into village organisations and river-level forums at the district level. To expand its reach and effectiveness, IC members require an enlarged fleet of 10 boats and 50 dewatering pumps, along with sufficient financial resources to hire trucks and vehicles suitable for rural terrain, as well as warehousing facilities to ensure the timely and efficient delivery of relief items to cut-off communities.
