

Similarly, the interest-free financing model, with generous subsidies and digital lending platforms, ensures affordability and accessibility for ordinary citizens. These projects are examples of governance that blends inclusivity with innovation, setting the stage for

Without a reliable and widespread network of charging stations, the vision of electric mobility risks stalling. Charging facilities must be developed at a fast pace, covering both urban and rural areas, to ensure uninterrupted operations of e-bikes, rickshaws, and taxis. The government, in partnership with the private sector, should prioritise this infrastructure, offering incentives to investors and ensuring that charging points are easily accessible, affordable, and safe.

cent will go to those using them for business purposes such as courier and delivery services. Additionally, 30 per cent of e-rickshaws/loaders will be allocated for fleet operators. The scheme will be implemented in two phases, starting with 40,000 e-bikes and 1,000 rickshaws/loaders. Buyers will benefit from government capital subsidies of up to Rs50,000 for e-

bikes and Rs200,000 for rickshaws/loaders, provided under an 80:20 debt-to-equity ratio. In cases

where the subsidy fully covers the equity portion, no upfront payment will be required.

According to the SBP, at least 25 per cent of e-bikes will be reserved for women, while up to 10 per

Borrowers will repay only the principal and insurance over two years for e-bikes and three years for rickshaws/loaders, as the government will bear the markup cost. The scheme will be managed digitally, with approved models and after-sales services ensured by the Engineering Development Board.



Sindh to Launch Pakistan's First EV Taxi Service



The Sindh government has fast-tracked plans to introduce Pakistan's first government-run taxi

collapsed 239 bridges, and killed 6,509 livestock. NDMA reported that 6.9 million people have been affected nationwide, including 4.7 million in Punjab, 1.6 million in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, 356,000 in Gilgit-Baltistan, and 185,000 in Sindh. Punjab remains the worst hit, with 2.7 million displaced and large areas of Multan and Muzaffargarh still submerged.

The 2025 monsoon floods in Pakistan have claimed 1,006 lives and injured 1,063 people between June 26 and September 19, according to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA). The disaster damaged or destroyed 12,569 households, swept away 1,981 kilometres of roads,

Local NGOs, including Indus Consortium members, are providing food, safe water, medical aid, and shelter to thousands daily. Relief groups have urged the government to exempt NGOs from regulatory approvals for six months, grant temporary relief on household bills, and support farmers

The Pakistan Meteorological Department said monsoon activity has largely withdrawn, with hot and dry weather forecast in Punjab and Sindh. The Indus River at Kotri is expected to remain at medium


